Dr. Carolyn Bailey Lewis Awarded Medal of Merit

Dr. Carolyn Bailey Lewis, a Guest at The Laurels of Athens, was awarded the Medal of Merit for Professional Achievement by the Ohio University Alumni Association in 2020. She proudly accepted her award this past November with her daughter Caryn by her side.

Dr. Lewis enjoyed an extensive career in radio and broadcasting, breaking barriers as the first African American woman director of WOUB Public Media and the first African American woman general manager of a PBS station in the United States. After earning her doctorate in 2007, she taught at the Scripps College of Communication at Ohio University. In 2016, she co-founded the Dr. Carolyn Foster Bailey Lewis Family Foundation, which provides scholarships for students in need and supports people with health issues. She is also an ordained minister and has served on numerous boards and committees focusing on diversity, inclusion, disability, and access. And she hasn't slowed down since retirement. She is the co-founder and CEO of LifeDay Greeting Cards, Inc., has a patent pending, and published a book in October of last year-Love and Loss: The Storied Nature of Nursing Home Care.

Lester Lytle, director of marketing at The Laurels of Athens, says, "Dr. Lewis is one of the most driven and exceptional people I have ever met. She is involved in more things than most people who work 40 hours a week."

Dr. Lewis loved every moment of the Homecoming weekend at which she was honored, which

included a private performance by the Ohio University Marching Band, a reception hosted by WOUB, the homecoming parade, and a red-carpet gala. She says, "What was special to me was one of my former WOUB students, Matt Barnes, hosted the awards ceremony. Also very special, a long-time friend from PBS' Mister Rogers' Neighborhood, David Newell, who is 'Mr. McFeely' and 'Speedy Delivery,' drove from Pittsburgh to celebrate my award and our friendship."

Congratulations to Gregg Ferguson, workers'compensation manager for Laurel Health Care Company, on completing coursework to become a Certified Occupational Safety Specialist (COSS).

In the safety and health field, a COSS coordinates the successful



implementation of corporate safety and health plans, conducts safety and health trainings, and provides support to safety and training managers.

The COSS certification program consists of 40 hours of hands-on, face-to-face learning delivered by OSHA-qualified safety instructors. Students are scored on daily quizzes, practical reviews, a safety presentation, and a comprehensive final exam. COSS is widely known to be the most difficult health and safety certification to obtain.
